Gospel

Mark 8:27-35

Jesus and his disciples set out for the villages of Caesarea Philippi. Along the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" They said in reply,

"John the Baptist, others Elijah, still others one of the prophets."

And he asked them,

"But who do you say that I am?"
Peter said to him in reply,

"You are the Christ."

Then he warned them not to tell anyone about him.

He began to teach them

that the Son of Man must suffer greatly and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes,

and be killed, and rise after three days. He spoke this openly.

Then Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him.

At this he turned around and, looking at his disciples,

rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan.

You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do."



He summoned the crowd with his
disciples and said to them,
"Whoever wishes to come after me
must deny himself,
take up his cross, and follow me.
For whoever wishes to save his life will
lose it,
but whoever loses his life for my sake

and that of the gospel will save it."

Reflecting on Living the Gospel

Jesus bluntly rebukes Peter, telling him, "You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do." Mark does not tell us what Peter had actually said to Jesus, but given that Jesus has just disclosed that he would be rejected and killed, it is not a stretch to believe that Peter rejected the need for this. Jesus's divinely ordained and freely chosen destiny is, in this context, God's "thinking."

When Peter identified Jesus as the Messiah, he must have had particular ideas not just of what this meant for the Messiah, God's Anointed One, but for those who were the Messiah's closest friends, his apostles and disciples. Whatever kingdom Peter's mind conjured, it probably did not involve denying himself and taking up his cross to follow Jesus or losing his life for the gospel. What kind of kingdom is that? Feel for Peter for a moment. What kind of ridiculous kingdom is built on the broken body of a defeated Messiah?

This is the kingdom of "God's thinking," the kingdom of paradox. In his book *Night of the Confessor*, the Czech priest and theologian Tomáš Halík says, "If we have never had the feeling that what Jesus wants of us is absurd, crazy, and impossible, then we've probably either been too hasty in taming or diluting the radical nature of his teaching by means of soothing intellectualizing interpretations, or (mostly naïvely, illusorily, or even hypocritically) we have too easily forgotten just to what extent—in our thinking, customs, and actions—we are rooted 'in this world' where totally different rules apply."

Jesus offers us "God's thinking," the thinking by which we save our lives by losing them and build a kingdom whose divine power is seen as human weakness.

Closing Prayer

Omnipotent Savior, we place all our hope in you. Help us, each day, to die to self as you died for each of us. You taught us that *whoever loses his life for the sake of the gospel will save it.* You are the Way, the Truth, and the Life. **Amen.**

For Reflection:

 Once again, we encounter Jesus's question to the disciples: "But who do you say that I am?" At this moment in your journey of faith, how would you answer this question?

Suggestions for group and individual use:

- 1. Pray aloud the "Opening Prayer" (in *The Roman Missal* called the "collect").
- 2. One person read aloud the gospel.
- 3. Each read prayerfully "Reflecting on Living the Gospel" and spend some time in personal prayer.
- 4. Share together responses to "For Reflection."
- 5. Pray the "Closing Prayer."
