James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to Jesus and said to him, "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you."

He replied, "What do you wish me to do for you?"

They answered him, "Grant that in your glory

we may sit one at your right and the other at your left."

Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking.

Can you drink the cup that I drink or be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?"

They said to him, "We can."

Jesus said to them, "The cup that I drink, you will drink,

and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized;

but to sit at my right or at my left is not mine to give

## Reflecting on Living the Gospel

No one in Mark's gospel approaches Jesus as arrogantly as James and John in today's reading. It is as though James and John have not heard one word of what Jesus has told them about the suffering and death that await him in Jerusalem. All that they are concerned about is "glory." They ask for the two best places next to him, on his right and on his left. Perhaps it is Jesus's deep sorrow at the obtuseness of the brothers' request that tempers his response to them. He answers with the images of "cup" and "baptism." In the Old Testament, the cup was a rich and ambivalent symbol. It could refer not only to overflowing joy and communion with God (Ps 23:5) and God's salvation (Ps 116:13), but also to the draining of the painful cup of punishment (Ps 11:6; Isa 51:17; Jer 49:12).

In his passion Jesus will gulp down the sins of the world, drain the cup of suffering and wrath so that it may be refilled with the joy of salvation. Can the brothers drink this same cup? The baptism of which Jesus speaks is his total submersion in the flood of suffering and death. Can James and John go with him into these depths of his passion?

The failure of his disciples to understand him, his mission, or his relationship to his Father, was an aspect of Jesus's suffering. Their desertion on the eve of his passion would add to the bitterness of the cup he would drink. Power and triumphalism, the desire for first places in the kingdom, have nothing to do with Christian leadership, yet into the hands of these frail and failing human beings Jesus entrusts the Christian community that would, in the power of his love and forgiveness, struggle through to resurrection with him. This is both our challenge and our consolation.

#### **Closing Prayer**

God of mysteries, you sent your son to redeem us; Christ gave *his life as a ransom for many.* We pray you give us an understanding of this astonishing gift, and too an understanding of the gift of dignity you have given to each of us. **Amen.** 

#### For Reflection:

• Jesus tells the disciples, "[T]he Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve." Who is a model of Christian servanthood in your life?

## Suggestions for group and individual use:

- 1. Pray aloud the "Opening Prayer" (in *The Roman Missal* called the "collect").
- 2. One person read aloud the gospel.
- 3. Each read prayerfully "Reflecting on Living the Gospel" and spend some time in personal prayer.
- 4. Share together responses to "For Reflection."
- 5. Pray the "Closing Prayer."
