Reflecting on Living the Gospel

The good teacher or wise parent often makes a point by exaggeration, as does Jesus in some of his parables, including the mini-parables in today's reading. To have a wooden beam in our own eye makes us a poor splinter-remover for someone else's eye. Smug superiority distorts our vision of ourselves and our neighbor. Some of us would have no trouble winning a black belt for innuendo and faint praise, so quick are we on the offensive against others, and even faster to defend ourselves.

Using the familiar biblical image of a tree whose quality is judged by the good or bad fruit it produces, Jesus teaches his listeners that the quality of people is judged by their actions. There is more involved here than "spiritual eye surgery" to get rid of the judgmental log that blinds us. It is a matter of the biblical heart, that deepest personal reality, the storehouse of our dreams and desires. One of the surest indicators of people is their words: words that are honest and match their deeds, as did Jesus's words, or words that are a sadly hypocritical script for playacting.

The mass media and politicians are a source of many words in contemporary society. The "doublespeak" we get so much of is dishonest and dangerous. We need the wisdom and discernment of which Jesus speaks. Recent history offers many examples of "doublespeak" that may be so familiar to our ears that our hearts no longer have a Christian reaction. "The final solution" meant the genocide of six million Jews; "collateral damage" in war means the killing of innocent civilians; a prison's "management unit" is a solitary confinement block. We need to take the pulse of our newspapers, TV, and governments to make a Christian diagnosis of such language and its reporters.

Closing Prayer

Loving God, thank you for the gift of this day and the opportunity to grow in relationship with you. So often we remain focused on the shortcomings of others—our family members, coworkers, and friends. Instead, help us to deeply examine the areas where we need growth, that we might produce good as we remain faithful to your Gospel and the way of life to which we are called. **Amen**.

For Reflection:

 Which "splinters" in someone else's eyes do you find yourself preoccupied with and how can you turn that focus on yourself, someone you can actually change?

Suggestions for group and individual use:

- 1. Pray aloud the "Opening Prayer" (in *The Roman Missal* called the "collect").
- 2. One person read aloud the gospel.
- Each read prayerfully "Reflecting on Living the Gospel" and spend some time in personal prayer.
- 4. Share together responses to "For Reflection."
- 5. Pray the "Closing Prayer."
