## Gospel

John 1:1-5, 9-14 (Shorter Form) or John 1:1-18 (Longer Form)

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God. and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came to be through him, and without him nothing came to be. What came to be through him was life, and this life was the light of the human race; the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came to be through him, but the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, but his own people did not accept him.

But to those who did accept him he gave power to become children of God, to those who believe in his name,



who were born not by natural generation nor by human choice nor by a man's decision

but of God.

And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us, and we saw his glory, the glory as of the Father's only Son, full of grace and truth.

## Reflecting on Living the Gospel

On this night, we hear the story of Christ's birth from the Gospel of Luke. The timing was neither ideal nor negotiable. There was not even time to secure adequate accommodations and Jesus Christ, the Son of God, was born in a stable and laid in a manger. Through this, we are reminded that God is prepared to do miraculous things in the midst of our everyday lives whether or not we are prepared for them. In other words, God's time will always have the final say. God's timing, though ultimately for our benefit, will not be dictated by our readiness.

This gospel challenges us to recognize that all moments are ripe with sacramentality, with miracle-potential. The shepherds in the field had no idea that they were working on the first Christmas. The angels appeared above, singing "Glory to God in the highest," and notified the shepherds that something monumental had occurred. At that moment, the shepherds had an important choice to make. They could embrace and listen to the message of the angels or they could dismiss it.

When we experience interruptions to our day-to-day routines, how do we respond? Is it with a spirit of openness, with the hopeful outlook that perhaps there is a message meant for us in the disruption? It is difficult to live in a way that leaves us fully open to whatever each moment presents. Sometimes love and duty require us to tend to our work and our routines with a single minded dedication and focus. There are times, however, when we need to be jolted out of those routines so that we can remember the sacredness and divine potential of each moment. This Christmas narrative serves as a reminder that the most significant gifts could arrive at seemingly insignificant (or inconvenient) times.

## **Closing Prayer**

Loving God, thank you for the gift of this day and the opportunity to grow in relationship with you. As we celebrate the birth of Christ, may we rejoice in your self-gift to us. Through the solidarity and hope of your incarnation may we remain faithful to your gospel and the way of discipleship. **Amen.** 

#### For Reflection:

• Jesus, the Word of God, entered fully into human life. Do you find this hard to believe? What parts of your life feel distant from how you understand Jesus's earthly experience?

# Suggestions for group and individual use:

- 1. Pray aloud the "Opening Prayer" (in *The Roman Missal* called the "collect").
- 2. One person read aloud the gospel.
- 3. Each read prayerfully "Reflecting on Living the Gospel" and spend some time in personal prayer.
- 4. Share together responses to "For Reflection."
- 5. Pray the "Closing Prayers."
