Gospel

Matthew 4:12-23 (Longer Form) or Matthew 4:12-17 (Shorter Form)

When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee.

He left Nazareth and went to live in Capernaum by the sea, in the region of Zebulun and Naphtali, that what had been said through Isaiah the prophet

might be fulfilled:

Land of Zebulun and land of Naphtali, the way to the sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles,

the people who sit in darkness have seen a great light,

on those dwelling in a land overshadowed by death

light has arisen.

From that time on, Jesus began to preach and say,

"Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

As he was walking by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers,

Simon who is called Peter, and his brother Andrew,

casting a net into the sea; they were fishermen.

He said to them,

"Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men."

At once they left their nets and followed him.



He walked along from there and saw two other brothers,

James, the son of Zebedee, and his brother John.

They were in a boat, with their father Zebedee, mending their nets.

He called them, and immediately they left their boat and their father and followed him.

He went around all of Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom, and curing every disease and illness among the people.

Opening Prayer

Almighty ever-living God, direct our actions according to your good pleasure, that in the name of your beloved Son we may abound in good works.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Reflecting on Living the Gospel

As he opens his public ministry, Jesus begins to call those who are willing to allow him to rule over their hearts and so spread the reigning presence of God and "make disciples of all nations" (Matt 28:19). His first call is to four fishermen at the Sea of Galilee, a place of a thriving fishing industry. He sees the brothers, Peter and Andrew, casting their nets into the lake. Casting nets is a labor-intensive job, demanding strength, long hours, unpredictable results, knowledge of what fish to keep and what to toss back (see Matt 4:18-22), and persistent dedication. To such men comes Jesus's invitation to follow him and use all their skills in a different kind of fishing: fishing for people.

Jesus then calls two other brothers, James and John. They are intent on other activities that are necessary for maintaining a successful fishing business: mending nets that, along with their boats, need to be kept in good repair. Jesus calls, and these two also respond to him. None of these first disciples can stay put. Peter and Andrew leave what appears to be their own established business; James and John disrupt accepted social conventions by leaving their father's business and family ties.

No matter what our own lifestyle or social situation, as disciples of Jesus we are all called at various times to leave something behind so that we can follow him. We, too, cannot stay put in an immature understanding of Jesus, cannot remain in enterprises that contradict our baptismal calling, or accept social structures that are contrary to the gospel ethic of love and respect for human dignity. Each of us has to name for ourselves, in our own time and place, how we radically turn our hearts to the following of Jesus.

Closing Prayer

Loving God, thank you for the gift of this day and the opportunity to grow in relationship with you. You call each one of us by name, just as you did with your first followers. May we fish for people as we remain faithful to your gospel and the way of discipleship. **Amen.**

For Reflection:

• This gospel is full of place names, reminding us that Jesus's ministry happened in a real place. Reflect on the places of your life, those you have called home and those you have left behind. How have they formed you into the disciple you are today?

Suggestions for group and individual use:

- 1. Pray aloud the "Opening Prayer" (in *The Roman Missal* called the "collect").
- 2. One person read aloud the gospel.
- 3. Each read prayerfully "Reflecting on Living the Gospel" and spend some time in personal prayer.
- 4. Share together responses to "For Reflection."
- 5. Pray the "Closing Prayers."
