PALM SUNDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION

APRIL 2, 2023

Gospel Matthew 27:11-54 (shorter form) or Matthew 26:14–27:66 (longer form)

Jesus stood before the governor, Pontius Pilate, who questioned him,

"Are you the king of the Jews?"

Jesus said, "You say so."

And when he was accused by the chief priests and elders,

he made no answer. . . .

Pilate said to them,

"Then what shall I do with Jesus called Christ?" They all said,

"Let him be crucified!" . . .

he handed him over to be crucified.

Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus inside the praetorium

and gathered the whole cohort around him.

They stripped off his clothes

and threw a scarlet military cloak about him.

Weaving a crown out of thorns, they placed it on his head.

and a reed in his right hand.

And kneeling before him, they mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!"

They spat upon him and took the reed and kept striking him on the head.

And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the cloak, dressed him in his own clothes

dressed him in his own clothes, and led him off to crucify him. . . .


From noon onward, darkness came over the whole land

And behold, the veil of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom.

The earth quaked, rocks were split, tombs were opened,

The centurion and the men with him who were keeping watch over Jesus

feared greatly when they saw the earthquake and all that was happening, and they said, "Truly, this was the Son of God!"

Who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Reflecting on Living the Gospel

The passion narrative that we proclaim today is a story of many people who, as Paul wrote to the Romans, do not do what they want, but do the very thing they hate and find it hard to believe that they could act this way (see Rom 7:15). Sinfulness is doing what, in our personal depths, we know is evil, because of fear, greed, social pressure, lust for power, or disregard for human life. In the garden of Gethsemane, Peter the Rock crumbles into a soft sand-drift of sleep. The traitor's kiss smacks them from their sleep, and the violence spawns a feeble swordplay until the words of Jesus, even in the context of such violence, command peace. Then those who had once left everything to follow Jesus (Matt 4:22) now leave everything to run away from him.

Peter crawls away to crouch like a spider in the dark corner of the high priest Caiaphas's courtyard. While Jesus is on trial inside, he is spinning his web of lies outside. But Matthew tells us that Peter will be saved, as we will be, by the remembrance of Jesus's words and by our tears over our betrayals of Jesus.

Jesus is handed over to Pilate, the Roman governor, who wishes that Jesus would wriggle out of his conscience and this trial. Pilate might not want to hand Jesus over, but he compromises himself because of social pressure. Only Pilate's wife honestly intervenes to try to save Jesus. Just as Matthew's infancy narrative had dreamers like Joseph and the magi, so here is another dreamer. But a woman's dreams and witness are unacceptable. Pilate washes his hands of the whole dirty matter. Compromise, dismissal of the "dreams" of others, peer pressure, and fear of losing upward social mobility: these can also send our truth as followers of Jesus gurgling down the drain.

Closing Prayer

Loving God, thank you for the gift of this day and the opportunity to grow in relationship with you. You are self-gift, embodied in humility and vulnerability. Following your example may we give of ourselves for others as we strive to remain faithful to your gospel and the way of discipleship. **Amen.**

For Reflection:

 With which character of the Passion story do you most identify? Why?

Suggestions for group and individual use:

- 1. Pray aloud the "Opening Prayer" (in *The Roman Missal* called the "collect").
- 2. One person read aloud the gospel.
- 3. Each read prayerfully "Reflecting on Living the Gospel" and spend some time in personal prayer.
- 4. Share together responses to "For Reflection."
- 5. Pray the "Closing Prayers."
